



Variety Roman Shades

This packet provides patterns and instructions for two decorative roman shades with valances. Also included are complete instructions for the basic straight roman shade and the hobbled shade.

Fabric suggestions: Fabrics with body or crispness work best for these shades. However they have allowances to hold wood slats, making other fabrics work well too. It is recommended that the valance be self-lined as lining may show around bottom edge. Line shades with a compatible lining. Rain-no-stain roc-lon is a good choice. Therma suede gives good insulation. Blackout lining is excellent, but heavy. You also have to be careful with stitching rings on this lining (light may come through at the needle holes).

YARDAGE

Yardage for all shades allows about 1 1/2" of excess in length.

VIEW A: Shade fabric needs to be 6" longer than the finished length and 4" wider than the finished width.

VIEW B and C: Shade fabric needs to be 3" longer than the finished length and 4" wider than the finished width. A facing of the shade fabric will be needed 8" deep and 2" wider than the finished width.

VALANCES: Cut length is 13". Allow width of shade plus 8" (for returns).

VIEW D: This shade holds fullness in every fold, even when shade is all the way down. To determine cut length of fabric, divide finished length by 6. Round off uneven numbers to the nearest number and then multiply by 12. Add an additional 6" allowance for the hems. Fabric needs to be 4" wider than finished width.

Same amount of lining will be needed.
